Park sale donations will be available on a sign-up sheet in the clubhouse with dates and times. If you have many items to donate, please text Denise Miller at 603-493-1719 with your name and address and a committee member will contact you.

SW Tennis will be the contractor for the pickleball court. They are in the process of pulling the permit to begin construction. Leitner Electric will be handling all electrical needs, and 12 Stones is heading the landscaping.

Tompkins Contracting will be the contractor for the front entrance changes. They will be responsible for pulling the permit. TCI will be handling the landscape, Accurate Electronics will be dealing with the gate controls, and Leitner Electric will be our electrical contractor.

Board member Bill Michals has been working on the infrastructure within our community and has been overseeing the drainage issues that may arise. One issue found was concrete in our drains on Valencia. **DO NOT PUT CONCRETE IN THE DRAINS!**

At this time, two CO-OP owned homes have been completed in remodeling. On October 1, 2024, one of those has been put under contract to be sold. Profits

will be used to complete future home remodeling projects.

The CO-OP has obtained ownership of four homes to be demolished. Those homes are 180, 229, 140 and 87.

# Have You Read Your Rules Lately?

**This is a reminder that the Rules and Regulations are in effect and being enforced. All Residents and their guests are expected to know and abide by these rules. New Rules and Regulations Update-The new rules and regulations were voted on and adopted by the Board of Directors on May 27, 2022. You can access the Rules and Regulations by going to our website at [orangeharbormhc.com](http://orangeharbormhc.com), click on the documents tab, click on community rules, and click on the pdf file.**

Approved by the Board of Directors on May 27, 2022  
The purpose of these Rules and Regulations is to promote the comfort, welfare, and safety of the residents of **ORANGE HARBOR MOBILE HOME AND RV RESORT** and to improve and maintain the appearance and reputation of the Corporation.  
These Rules and Regulations have been established by the Board of Directors of ORANGE HARBOR CO-OP, INC. (hereinafter called the "Co-op"), the owner of the community, and may be changed by them from time to time to achieve this and other purposes. Notice of changes in these Rules and Regulations shall be given to the residents at least 90 days prior to the date of the implementation of the changes.

### III. THE MANUFACTURED HOME

1. Manufactured homes shall be attractively maintained and comply with all applicable laws, ordinances and regulations of state, county, or community as from time to time amended. The resident shall submit to management an application to install a new home indicating all required information. The maximum length and the optimum position on the lot will be determined upon examination of the site by management.

2. All plans for construction or exterior decorating or finishes must first be submitted to management for written approval before proceeding with the construction. No items are to be stored or left sitting outside the home except furniture specifically designed for outdoor use. Detached buildings are not permitted. aluminum products must be new material and must comply with local building codes. No home appurtenances, accessories or add-ons are to look unfinished or homemade.

3. No building, structure, installation, or other improvements shall be placed on any Lot until the plans have been approved by management. Plans may be disapproved solely based on aesthetic standards established at the discretion of the Co-op. All work

conducted by either the resident or a licensed contractor must meet current governmental regulations and required permits must be obtained.

4. Manufactured home ties-downs and blocking must comply with all applicable government laws, ordinances, and regulations.

5. All contractors must be licensed and have a valid proof of liability and workman's compensation insurance to conduct work in the community.

6. All manufactured homes within the community must meet, at any time and from time to time, then current community established standards respecting the maintenance of the manufactured home, fire standards, health standards, and all other standards as further imposed respecting the manufacture of manufactured homes by federal and state agencies inclusive of the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

7. No manufactured home shall be removed or brought into the community without the prior approval of management. Any resident intending to remove their manufactured home from the community must give the Co-op thirty (30) day notice in writing prior thereto. The resident shall remain responsible for either the Co-op Fee or rental fee until their manufactured home has either been sold or re-conveyed to the Co-op.

8. Management reserves the right to enter a manufactured home after the resident's prior written consent has been obtained or to prevent imminent danger to an occupant of the manufactured home or the manufactured home, without liability. Such consent may be revoked in writing by the Resident at any time. Management has the right to enter onto the lot for purposes of repair and replacement of utilities and protection of the community at all reasonable times, but not in such manner as to interfere unreasonably with the resident's quiet enjoyment of the lot.

9. No window air conditioners are permitted in front of the manufactured home or facing the street.



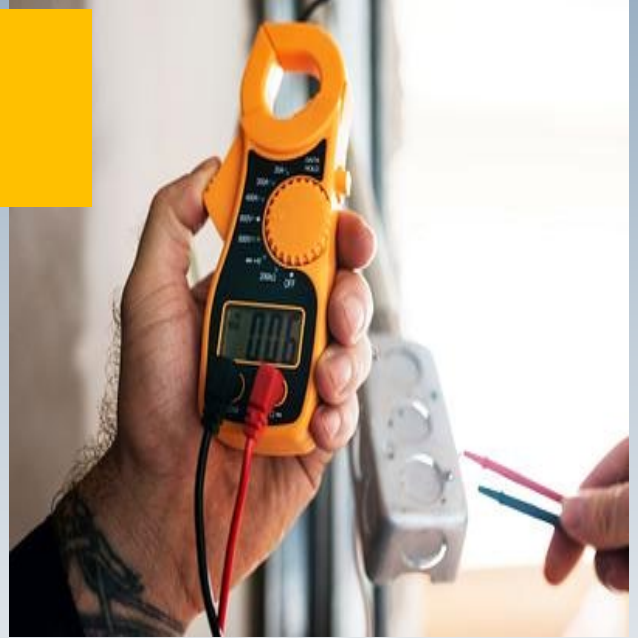

## Swimming Pool

The pool is open from sunrise to sunset. All guests 14 and under must be accompanied by an adult. If you remove the pool rope that is across the pool separating the deep end to the shallow end, **PLEASE PUT IT BACK**. We will be fined if safety protocol is not followed.

## Library

The library is full of books, puzzles, and games in the clubhouse. Please return them when you are finished.

## Billiards

Be sure to use our new billiards table in the clubhouse. Please respect the rules pertaining to them.

## Ice Machine

The ice cube machine is in the clubhouse. Please use the scooper provided, take maximum 3 scoops, and please close the lid.

## Bocce Ball

Enjoy our bocce ball courts with all the equipment you need near the court located next to the clubhouse parking lot.

## Shuffleboard

Shuffleboard equipment is for everyone's use and can be found in the shed next to the court.

## Storage and Boat Slips

There are 41 storage spaces on the premises and 17 Boat slips. All spaces are rented annually and are rented first come, first served. Please contact the office for prices.

## Clubhouse

The clubhouse is in the heart of the community. It is where we host a lot of our activities. It is available to rent for special occasions. Please contact Denise Miller at 603-493-1719.

## Garbage Disposal and Plant Cuttings

There is a dumpster and plant cutting trailer available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Please do not put large items in the trash compactor. All large items need to be paid for with the proper sticker from the office. Please place the appropriate items in the correct trailer.

## Boat Ramps

We have two boat ramps in the park. One is located near the office and the other is next to gypsy hall near the RV section. Please do not park trucks or trailers where they will be towed when launching your boat.

## Horseshoe Pits

There are horseshoe courts near the pavilion and pool. Please replace the equipment when done using.

## Fishing Pier & Fish Cleaning Station

There is a fishing pier available to all residents on the NW side of the park. Please obey all fishing regulations and dispose of your used fishing line in the proper waste bin that is available at the pier. There is a fish cleaning station in the RV park that has a cutting surface and running water. Please dispose of your fish carcasses appropriately.

## Dog Park

For your convenience there is a fenced in dog park open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week for your pets. There are dog waste bags and bins. **PLEASE** clean up after your pet.

## Pavilions

There are two pavilions on the premises. One is located near the pool and the other is located in the RV section. They are available for rent for special occasions. Please contact Denise Miller at 603-493-1719 to make a reservation.

## 5 Things Boaters Never Maintain, But Should

A well-maintained boat is a happy boat. Most of us who've been on the water for more than a few years pay strict attention to our maintenance routines. But boats have lots of parts, and they're constantly exposed to the elements, doused with water, or fried by the sun. Miss the maintenance on a moving part and there's a good chance that, sooner or later, it will cease moving altogether. Here are five commonly ignored items that should be on your list of maintenance chores.

1. **Gas-assist struts**-The struts that make it easy to raise and lower your deck hatches are often advertised as "maintenance-free." And it's true that the gas-filled piston isn't meant to be disassembled or even repaired. However, you can extend that life by simply keeping them clean. Wipe the strut with a clean cloth and rinse the entire unit with freshwater every now and again, especially if it's been exposed to saltwater.
2. **Screws**-Have you ever found a screw rolling around on your deck and wonder where the heck did that come from? At least once or twice a season, grab a screwdriver, put it on every screw you can find, and tighten up all that are loose.
3. **Snaps**-One would think that a simple snap could be ignored, well maybe, but if you struggle to get those snaps on and off, you could pull one out of the fiberglass or canvas. Annual maintenance will help. There are plenty of dedicated snap lubricants on the market, but any standard-issue silicone or Teflon lube will do the trick. Dabbing on a bit of wax as you wax your boat works fine, too.
4. **Steering and tilt mechanisms**-If your boat has one or more outboards, chances are the engines turn in a swivel bearing (also called a swivel bracket) and/or through a steering bracket. These may be the least well-maintained parts of the average outboard owner's power system because many boaters never even realize that there are Zerk fittings back there and you need to hit them with grease. If the

bearing or bracket fails, it's catastrophic because you can't turn the motor anymore. And replacing it usually requires pulling the motor off the boat, so it can be very expensive.

5. **Zippers**-Ever wonder why your boat's zippers are so darn tough to use? Like snaps, misbehaving zippers are something we all tend to deal with via an application of force which can lead to damage. You can get zipper lubricant and some of the snap lubes out there are dual-purpose. Or you can use an old seafarer's trick and simply rub a wax candle up and down the zipper.

**Bonus tip**- Plastic parts exposed to the sun need maintenance too. To protect it, use a dedicated plastic cleaner/restorer. It will shine and seal the plastic without any inadvertent damage.

### What is Veterans Day?

Veterans Day (originally known as Armistice Day) is a federal holiday in the U.S. observed annually on November 11, for honoring military veterans of the United States Armed Forces. It coincides with other holidays including Armistice Day and Remembrance Day which are commemorated in other countries that mark the anniversary of the end of WWI. Major hostilities of World War I were formally ended at the 11<sup>th</sup> hour of the 11<sup>th</sup> day of the 11<sup>th</sup> month of 1918 when the Armistice with Germany went into effect. At the urging of major U.S. veteran organizations, Armistice Day was renamed Veterans Day in 1954.

Veterans Day is distinct from Memorial Day, a U.S. public holiday in May. Veterans Day commemorated the service of all U.S. veterans, while Memorial Day honors those who have died while in military service.







## Do Not Put FROG Into the Drain!

Help us prevent fats, rags, oils and grease clog/blockages in the sewer system. Raw or partially treated sewage can back up into homes or flow into the streets, rivers, and bay. Do not put the following items down the drain:

Food scraps, butter, margarine, cooking oils, sauces, dairy products, greasy leftovers. Facial tissues, baby wipes, disinfectant wipes, moist wipes, toilet bowl scrub pads, napkins, paper towels, dental floss, eggshells, nutshells, bones and coffee grounds, hair, sanitary napkins, tampons, condoms. Vitamins, medicines, sheet plastic, or plastic of any kind, diapers. **The best recommendation for toilet paper is that it is made from 100% recycled materials.**



### We Recycle on Fridays

Please place your handle towards your house and the open side toward the street for proper pickup!

### Recycle Smart-5 For the Cart:

**Paper**-junk mail, newsprint, magazines, copy paper, phone books, etc. **DO NOT** put in used paper towels, tissues, napkins.

**Metal cans**-aluminum or steel (tin) cans. No need to remove labels or crush cans.

**Cardboard**-Any kind of box unless it held a liquid (such as those to hold milk, juice, wine, and broth). Pizza box lids can be recycled, the bottoms can be recycled if they do not have any food residue on them.

**Plastic Containers**-Look for the number 1-7 within the recycle triangles on the bottom of the container (no Styrofoam, no plastic bags) Lids can be either on or off.

**Glass**-green, brown, and clear bottles and jars.

There are only 2 things that can be flushed down the toilet when you live in a community with lift station waste disposal systems like we have. Those are 1) human waste and 2) toilet tissue. Do not put wipes in the pipes or pour grease down the drain either. That is also not good for the system and leads to very costly repairs.

As you are aware, one of the goals of all residents of Orange Harbor is to keep the community looking beautiful. Enforcing the rules plays an important role in that goal. The goal of this policy is NOT to penalize residents or to charge fines. The goal is simply to keep our community attractive and to remind all residents that we all share in this responsibility. 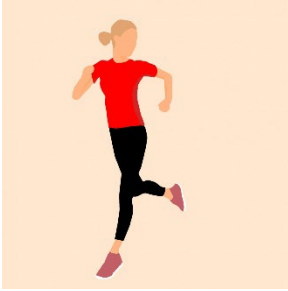

- 6. Help a neighbor take care of their yard.** Sometimes we have a neighbor who is either disabled, elderly, or a single parent who struggles to manage their yard work.

Brainstorm how you can help take care of a practical need.

- 7. Drop off bus passes at a local school.** Some students struggle to get to school every day because they can't drive them to school. If you drop off bus passes at a school office, the front office staff can offer it to students who are in need of public transportation help.
- 8. Donate blood.** Many local blood banks are operating at a shortage. Did you know that one single blood donation has the potential to help up to four people? Something you take for granted may be the answer to a stranger's health concern.
- 9. Volunteer at a homeless shelter.** Shelters can always use extra hands whether it is handing out food or helping prepare food. So, call your local shelter and find out when they are in need of an extra hand.

## Online Shopping Scams

With the holiday season fast approaching, be on the lookout for scams. Online shopping scams involve scammers pretending to be legitimate online sellers, either with a fake website or a fake ad on a genuine retailer site. While many online sellers are legitimate, unfortunately scammers can use the anonymous nature of the internet to rip off unsuspecting shoppers.

Scammers use the latest technology to set up fake retailer websites that look like genuine online retail stores. They may use sophisticated designs and layouts, possibly stolen logos, and even a domain name similar to an authentic retailer. Many of these websites offer luxury items such as popular brands of clothing, jewelry and electronics at very low prices. Sometimes you will receive the item you paid for. More likely than not, if you receive anything, it will be a knockoff of the item you thought you purchased. Other times you will receive nothing at all.

The biggest tip-off that a retail website is a scam is the method of payment. Scammers will often ask you to pay using a money order, pre-loaded money card or wire transfer, but if you send your money this way, it's unlikely you will see it again or receive your purchased item.

A newer version of online shopping scams involves the use of social media platforms to set up fake online stores. Scammers open the store for a short time, often selling fake branded clothing or jewelry. After making a number of sales, the stores disappear. Scammers also use social media to advertise their fake website, so do not trust a site just because you have seen it advertised or shared on social media. The best way to detect a fake trader or social media online shopping scam is to search for reviews before purchasing.

### Warning Signs

- A product is advertised at an unbelievably low price or advertised to have amazing benefits or features that sound too good to be true.
- The other party insists on immediate payment, or payment by electronic funds transfer or a wire service. They may insist that you pay up-front for vouchers before you can access a cheap deal or a giveaway.

- The social media based store is very new and selling products at very low prices. The store may have limited information about delivery and other policies.
- An online retailer does not provide adequate information about privacy, terms and conditions of use, dispute resolution or contact details. The seller may be based overseas, or the seller does not allow payment through a secure payment service such as PayPal or a credit card transaction.

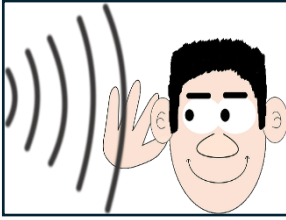
### Protect Yourself

- Check if the website or social media page has a refund or returns policy, and that their policies sound fair. The better online shopping and auction sites have detailed complaint or dispute handling processes in case something goes wrong.
- When using retail websites, find out exactly who you are dealing with. Research the retailer and know if you are dealing with a domestic or foreign entity and if the items you are ordering will be shipped from overseas.
- When making online payments, only pay for items using a secure payment service — look for a URL starting with “https” and a closed padlock symbol, or a payment provider such as PayPal. Think twice before using virtual currencies such as bitcoin — they do not have the same protections as other transaction methods, so you can't get your money back once you send it.
- Avoid any arrangement with a stranger that asks for up-front payment via money order, wire transfer, international funds transfer, pre-loaded card or electronic currency, like Bitcoin. It is rare to recover money sent this way. Never send money or give credit card or online account details to anyone you don't know or trust.

Report suspected scams to the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services by filing a complaint or contact your financial institution.





## Say What?

Hearing loss isn't just a thing that happens to your parents. Nearly one in five people in their 20's show

signs of it already. And it puts your brain and well-being in danger, too. An estimated 15 percent of American adults—that's about 38 million people—have some levels of hearing loss, according to the CDC. Research increasingly suggests that untreated hearing loss can lead to other significant health issues, including depression and Alzheimer's disease.

Among 20-to 69-year-olds, men are almost twice as likely as women to have trouble hearing. The World Health Organization says 1 billion young adults are at risk of permanent, avoidable hearing loss due to "unsafe listening practices," like top-volume clubs, concerts, and sound from their own earbuds.

But here's the irony: While we're used to having things in our ears, roughly 60 percent of seniors say they don't wear a hearing aid because they fear others will view them as elderly and disabled.

Stereocilia are tiny hairlike cells in the spiral-shaped cochlea of the inner ear that bend in response to sound waves, triggering a signal to the brain for processing. These hairs wear down over time, especially with loud sounds, to the point that they can't respond to soft tones. People who need a hearing aid will wait an average of ten years before getting help for their hearing trouble. That's a mistake, because Cilia can't come back, and you'll need sounds to be louder and thus damaging. The resulting hearing loss may increase the risk of dementia.

First, find out how much you can (or can't) hear. Free apps like Mimi, SonicCloud, JacotiListen give you a hearing score. If you have a mild to moderate problem, consider an over-the-counter hearing device. Most hearing aids today are inconspicuous (to the point of being nearly invisible), high-tech, and easy to wear.

# Roseate Spoonbills

Roseate Spoonbills (*Ajaia ajaja*) are one of the most beloved birds in Florida. Birders and researchers from around the world visit Florida for the chance to see Roseate Spoonbills. Roseate Spoonbills are members of the Ibis family. They hunt, forage, and socialize together and often live in colonies of 100 pairs of birds. Roseate Spoonbills are beautiful when viewed from afar, but take on a bizarre appearance when viewed up-close, or in fine detail. Still, they are beautiful and graceful in their own way.

Adult Roseate Spoonbills have bright red/pink shoulders. Their underwings are also pink. They are often mistakenly identified as flamingos because of their pink coloration. Juveniles are also pink, but their coloration is less vibrant.

Roseate Spoonbills were almost hunted to extinction in the past. Along with other birds of Florida, spoonbills were hunted for their feathers, or plumage, which were used in women's hats, fans, and other fashions. The birds were only saved from extinction thanks to the Audubon Society, which pressured states to stop the plumage trade in the years around 1910. The protective laws helped reduce demand for the feathers, which helped bird populations recover. At the worst of the crisis there were only about 100 surviving pairs of spoonbills in the United States. As late as 1930 there were only 500 nesting pairs observed. Today Roseate Spoonbills in Florida are designated as a "Species of Special Concern."

## Habitat

Roseate Spoonbills have a relatively diverse habitat range. Roseate Spoonbills are found along the coastlines of South Florida, from the southern islands of the Florida Keys, Florida Bay and Everglades, and as far north as Tampa. Roseate Spoonbills are also found throughout the coastal Gulf of Mexico region, as far east as Texas and northeast Mexico. Roseate Spoonbills have specific nesting and habitat preferences. Protected lands in Everglades National Park and Florida Bay provide ideal conditions for spoonbills, especially areas with dense mangroves, offshore islands and marshland. Spoonbills especially prefer islands because their nests are kept safe from predators, like racoons. Roseate Spoonbills are vulnerable to environmental impact, especially habitat loss, water pollution and other impacts of coastal development.

## Diet

Roseate Spoonbills feed on many forms of wildlife:

- Crabs
- Crayfish
- Aquatic Insects
- Mollusks
- Minnows and Small Fish
- Shrimp



Roseate Spoonbills have highly specialized fishing techniques, and highly adapted physiology for their hunting style. They forage in shallow water, including fresh, brackish and saltwater environments. They are usually found in lagoons, wetlands, bays, mangrove forests and swamp forests. Spoonbills dip their bills into shallow water and mud. Their bills are equipped with sensitive receptors which can detect prey. When they detect prey their bills snap shut suddenly.

(P.S. I would be remiss to not write about the Roseate Spoonbill for it is my second most favorite bird to the flamingo!)

# Top 10 Energy Savings Ideas from FP&L

## 1. Adjust Your Thermostat

- Set your thermostat to 78° or the highest temperature where you can still be comfortable while you are home and 82° F when you're away. Each degree you raise your thermostat between 75° – 78° can save you 3-5% on your monthly cooling costs. That's a lot when cooling makes up approximately 60% of your bill!
- **Bonus savings: Save up to \$2,150 with FPL rebates and federal tax credits** when you upgrade to an energy-efficient A/C unit.

## 2. Refresh Your Air Filter

- Replace or clean your air filter regularly for cleaner air and a more efficient heating and cooling system. When you get your FPL bill, use it as a reminder to change your filter.

## 3. Be a Fan of Your Fan

- Turn off your ceiling fan when you leave the room. A fan that runs all the time could cost more than \$7 a month. The "wind chill" effect cools people, not rooms.

## 4. Use Hot Water Wisely

- The second-largest energy user in your home is usually your water heater. Lowering the temperature from 140° to 120° could save 3 to 5% on your energy costs.

## 5. Limit the time you run your pool pump:

- We recommend you limit the run time to:
- Summer - six hours a day
- Winter - four hours a day
- By maintaining your pool's cleanliness, water clarity and chemical levels, you may be able to reduce your pool pump's run time and save up to \$100 per year.

## 6. Load smart to wash and dry efficiently

- **Washer:** Adjust the water level on your washing machine to match the load size, choose the cold rinse whenever possible and try to wash full

loads. It takes as much energy to wash a single item as it takes to wash a full load.

- **Dryer:** Use the auto sensor function on your dryer to conserve energy by not over-drying your clothes and clean the lint filter in your dryer before every load to dry your clothes faster.

## 7. Cool coil care for your refrigerator

- The refrigerator/freezer is the third largest energy user in your home. Dust and dirt on refrigerator coils make it work harder. Vacuum or brush coils every 6 months to maintain peak efficiency.
- An extra refrigerator that is hardly used can add up to \$100 a year in energy costs.

## 8. Use precision cooking with small appliances

- Consider using a microwave, toaster oven, air fryer, or other small appliance instead of the oven whenever possible. These use about one-third the power of an oven broiler.

## 9. Let the star be your guide

- Look for ENERGY STAR-labeled electronics or appliances. Newer ENERGY STAR models meet stricter requirements and use anywhere from 10 to 50 percent less energy each year.

## 10. Unplug energy phantoms

- Many electronics continue to draw power even when they appear to be "off." These phantom energy users can account for up to 5-10% of monthly residential electricity use.
- Consolidate plugs by using power strips and switching them off when not in use. This will help reduce phantom loads and can help save up to \$100 a year.

Golf carts need to stay on their side of the street, stop at all corners, and proceed into an intersection after carefully looking both ways. Please follow the speed limit of 15 mph on our streets and stop at all **STOP** signs for the safety of our residents.

Any changes or modifications must be submitted to the Arc committee for review and consideration. **Homeowners must comply with all local and state building codes and obtain permits as required.** When using a contractor, the homeowner must obtain the business license, Certificate of Insurance (COI) showing coverage for Liability and Workman’s Compensation (Certificate Holder must show Orange Harbor Co-Op Inc. on the COI) Any unapproved or non-complying improvements may be subject to enforcement procedures, including but not limited to the demand of removal, imposition of fines, and/or legal injunctions at the homeowner’s expense.

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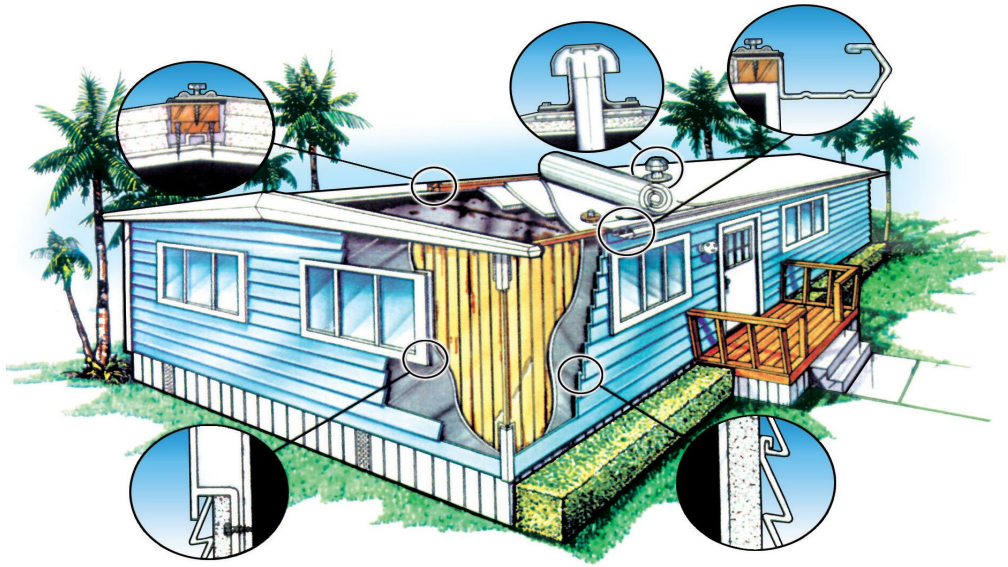

**“Idle Speed, No Wake” Zone: A designated area where vessels must be operated at a speed no greater than that which is necessary to maintain steerage and headway. The vessel should not produce a wake at this speed.**

**The Caloosahatchee River has a “slow wake” from November 15 to March 31.**

**Slow-No Wake means operating a boat at the slowest speed necessary to maintain steerage and reduces or eliminates waves that appear as white water behind the boat. the same location frequently.**

**Resume normal operating speed from April 1- November 14.**

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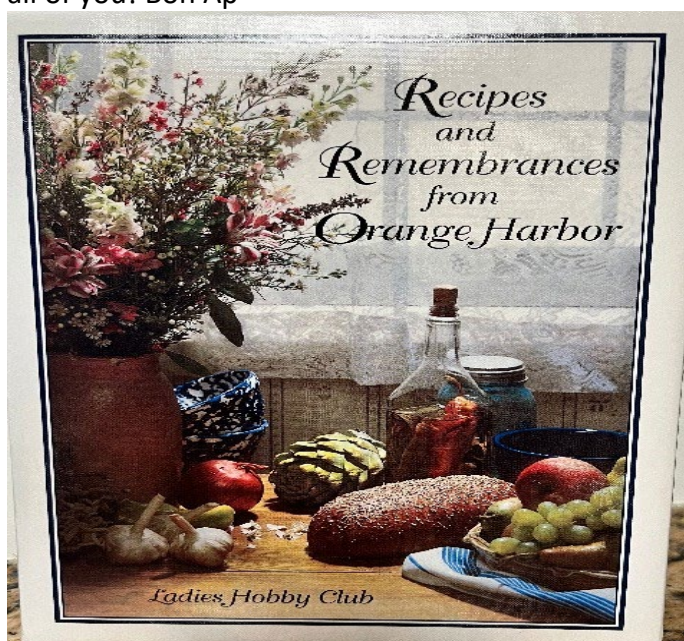
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## Cook's Corner

- ID tags with phone numbers for collars and/or harnesses.
- Leashes, harnesses, and carriers to transport pets safely and securely.
- Water and food for 7 days.
- Medication for 7 days.
- Vaccination records, medical conditions, behavior problems, feeding schedule, vet information stored in a water-proof container. This is needed if you must board your pets.
- Current photo of your pets in case they get lost.
- Pet bed, toys, treats, food bowls.

**\*Reminder-** pet owners to observe the park rules regarding dogs, as failure to comply will result in a

**violation letter!** 1. Pick up and dispose of dog waste in YOUR trash or in the dog waste receptacles at the dog park. 2. Always keep your dog on a leash and walk them on the road. 3. Do not allow your dog to walk, defecate, or urinate in other resident's yards or RV sites. 4. Dogs must always be accompanied by an owner, when outside a residence or RV. 5. You must keep your dog under control, especially around other dogs, and pedestrians. 6. Under the noise ordinance, excessive barking is considered a nuisance to other residents; inside or outside a residence. 7. ALL PETS must be registered in the office. 8. Please keep cats on leash and do not let them out of your home unsupervised. **Don't forget to send in your dog and/or cat vaccinations to the office.**

**Please remember to keep your pets on a leash and please keep pets off the picnic tables in the pavilion and gypsy haul. Unfortunately, this has happened too often. Only food and drink are to be used on the tables.**

### Lee County, Florida dog laws

- All cats, dogs, and ferrets over four months old must be vaccinated against rabies and licensed by Lee County.
- Dogs must be on a leash that does not exceed 8 feet in length and wear a collar with a valid county license attached.
- Dogs are not permitted in certain areas like playgrounds, ballfields, and indoor buildings.
- Pets cannot be fastened, chained, or tethered to trees, buildings, fences, or posts.

You then will press the number 9 on your phone, repeatedly, if need be, and the gate will open. If you do not want to look for your special code, your visitor can follow the steps on the pin pad of the kiosk. If you have any questions, please stop in, or call the office.
